Let us be more willing to see and help those in need; let all our contact with others shed some of the Light of Christ that should be in us. Let us spend more time actively tuning our hearts into Christ's 'wavelength.'

As this Newsletter hits the press we shall be close to 4th October, the Feast day of St Francis of Assisi – observed in the Celtic Orthodx calendar also as the 'Feast of Creation'. A fairly obvious link as we often instinctively link Francis with the natural world. The photo shows a woodcarving of him, together with armfuls of birds and flowers, that I was given by a group I led to Assisi many years ago.

In fact I was nearly named Francis after my mother's brother who died during the war. My father didn't say anything but was silently unimpressed (he thought it was a sissy name and anyway he had other ideas). Perhaps over trustingly he was sent off to register my birth. He arrived back with the Certificate with just 'John' on it, the name of his beloved stepfather – I believe a state of hostility ensued!! Some sort of peace

was achieved by adding the name Francis at my baptism (together with George) but, as he didn't really approve of middle names anyway, it was never used.


Francis though is a Saint we can all feel a pull towards:yes, in one sense he was a bit crazy, a bit extreme, a bit over the top. Yet he understood something about the importance of Creation and what it has to teach us about God and our faith. The Celtic Orthodox Church, of course, resonates firmly with that. Whatever else 'Celtic Christianity' brought to the Church a resonance with the natural order and a respect for Creation has got to be right near the top.

I was wowed by the miracle of nature at the end of this summer. What an astonishing summer it's been! Walking across grass that was so dried out it crunched underfoot and with leaves fallen early. which sounded like stepping on glass. One doubted that it would ever recover; and then the rain started and in just a couple of days one could see signs of life again. Within a week the grass looked as if nothing had ever happened; in next to no time one looked out in astonishment at what seemed like a true miracle, yet another miracle of Creation, new Green growth where something had appeared to be completely dead. Suddenly it was time to cut the grass!

Nature is full of little miracles. I guess that is why the Celtic peoples paid so much attention to it, and learnt so much about it which was helpful to them in their Christian lives. The natural world was interwoven into their ordinary daily lives. Let us learn from it too.

The other aspect of Francis is in his call to simplicity. This too was woven into the outlook of the Celtic Church and is enshrined in its very foundation. Simplicity and a simple life often seem to be looked down on, yet where simplicity is to be found, there too we find God.


2025-26 Liturgical Calendar

IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT

Following the recent AGM of the Woodbury Community Hall Committee (where we hold our monthly Liturgies) we have received notification that the hall management is running into difficulties filling important administrative roles, and that unless people are found to take on these roles the hall will be SOLD.

This would be very sad for us as we have only recently found such a good and convenient home for our Church. Here are extracts from the letter we have received from the President. Is it possible that you or anyone you know might be prepared to step forward.

From the Hon Life President of the Hall Committee

Dear Hall User,

It is with deep regret that I am writing to inform you that, unless a Chairperson and Secretary can be found by Thursday 13th November 2025, the hall will close.

At last night's AGM, our outgoing Chair & Secretary reiterated the desire they expressed two years ago that they wished to step down. Constitutionally the hall cannot operate without a Chair and Secretary.

The hall was built in 1933, and having given such excellent service for so long it was proposed that an Extraordinary General Meeting be convened for 13th November at 7.30pm at the hall, so that everyone benefitting from it may be given the opportunity to reflect upon our position, in the hope that two people will volunteer for the vacant posts.

If no one is forthcoming it was proposed that steps will have to be taken to sell the whole facility.

In view of this, I put to you that it would be tragic if Woodbury Community Hall is to close. PLEASE, consider very seriously if you could undertake one or other of these vacant roles on the Hall Committee. Our retiring Chair and Hon Secretary have honed the two positions down to make them workable without it needing to be an overwhelming commitment. A clear job description is available to any prospective candidate. You could stand for a defined period of time, say two or preferably three years. Please think about this seriously.
