The blessing of the Lord and His mercy be with you all!


I want to wax lyrical about the glorious autumn colours we are now seeing, and I certainly do appreciate them, and, indeed, all the beauty of God's Creation, but this

joy of heart is presently tempered by the heart-aching devastation of which we are all too deeply aware – death and destruction on a scale we can scarcely comprehend in Ukraine, Gaza and elsewhere, and, as I write, the unimaginable hurricane destruction and long-term damage in the Caribbean. And what is doubly heart-breaking is that so much of this is manmade.

These things need to be in our prayers. We may feel overwhelmed and inadequate about our prayers for such mighty matters, yet pray we must, not telling God what He must do but quietly holding wordlessly those suffering, and those causing the suffering, before God. One of my favourite passages from St Paul comes to mind: "the Spirit helps us in our weakness. For we do not know what to pray for as we ought, but the Spirit Himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words." (Rom 8.26)

Do not lose heart but trust in God still.




### From Fr Patrick

Greek saint, St Arsenios of Paros, said, "when the church of the British Isles begins to venerate her own saints, then the Church will grow." The quote is a statement on the importance of honouring local saints and traditions for a community's spiritual revival and growth.

I think it's important, as we approach the Hallowtide tridium to meditate and encourage ourselves to keep on keeping on. The days are plunged into darkness and cold. Simple tasks are made much more difficult due to sluggish movements, which show the effects on our physical bodies. But perhaps our Spiritual practices have also become much more difficult to complete.

The Church, in her wisdom, uses the cold and darkness around us to remind us of death, which isn't too much of a stretch of the imagination as to why.

Of course, the Church doesn't just wallow in this potential for sorrow and despair. Rather, we are reminded to keep our eyes fixed upon Christ. Christ is the light that shines in the darkest of places, and brings the hope of new life in the world to come.

Just as throughout the day we can still experience glimpses of light that remind us of the warmth and joys of the brighter seasons, Christ has blessed us with glimpses into what a life in complete union with Himself may look like. What are these glimpses into a life united to Christ? The Saints! the Communion of Saints, or that faithful cloud of witnesses, as described in the letter to the Hebrews who offer, continually before God, their prayers for our perseverance into our union with, in and through Christ, all the time cheering us on. They are lights set upon a hill top for all to see, leaving examples in their lives that we ought to follow in order to overcome the evil and darkness of this world. They have left practical guides, methods and teachings in prayer and sanctification for our pilgrim journey towards theosis.

Therefore, this Hallowtide while still celebrating local customs as appropriate, let us remember especially our Celtic saints who have lived, suffered, and died for Christ and in doing so have trail-blazed a clear path to imitate Christ within this world; not escaping the world, but over coming it with the light of Christ, which dispels all darkness in our lives so long as we allow the loving grace of God to melt away the frostbitten hearts of stone and give us hearts of living flesh.




## LAST REMINDER: 2025-26 Liturgical Calendar
